funding portal you must be a VCSE organisation working in the City of Manchester with at least 50% of your beneficiaries in the City of Manchester. VCSE organisations working outside of the City of Manchester, consultants, sole traders, statutory bodies, private businesses and infrastructure organisations who become members of Macc aren't eligible to access our funding portal. Financial support in the form of grants is available to registered charities, CIC's and voluntary organisations. The Charity Service are keen to support organisations that are working 'on the ground' directly supporting disadvantaged people within the Greater Manchester area. Grant funds are available for:

- the purchase or supply of activities, amenities or equipment that will improve the general welfare of the local community or an individual
- the purchase or supply of activities, amenities or items of a medical nature NOT supplied by the NHS
- new project costs (for a specific period)
- any other charitable purpose that has a direct impact on the welfare of the local community or an individual
- holidays or days out to visit an attraction for children who are disadvantaged, disabled, sick and/or convalescent whose family are unable to afford the cost (referral must be via a supporting agency)
