

<p>Aims/priorities:</p>	<p>Funding is available for small-scale arts and/or community and social welfare projects in England and Wales. The Foundation favours revenue proposals over capital requests and focuses its funding on the following main themes:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Rural • Arts • Community • Small charities • Wales

This money can be used to support people through buddying schemes, help families to access services like registering for GPs or opening bank accounts, or find employment. The Voluntary, Community and Social Enterprise (VCSE) grant schemes will provide community support in every region across England and nationally for Hong Kong BN(O) status holders. The government is also making £100,000 available for an organisation to develop education resources for schools and colleges in the UK to teach young people about the nation's historic connection and commitment to Hong Kong.</p>

They fund organisations working to combat this disadvantage and to make a real difference to children and young people's lives. Applicants must be able to state why they are best placed to make a difference to the lives of disadvantaged children and young people, including:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Their well-established links with young people • The skills and expertise they have for the work they are requesting funding for • Their track record delivering the work they are requesting funding for. This is especially important for applicants for the Main Grants Programme. • How they work alongside other organisations in their local community
<p>Who can apply?</p>	<p>Registered not-for-profit organisations who work with disadvantaged children and young people of 18 years and under living in the UK.</p>
