Manchester Holiday Buzz Playscheme Fund 2019–2020

Aims/priorities: The purpose of the Playscheme Fund is to complement the all year round play offer in Manchester. The funding aims to enable open access play activities, primarily over the Summer 2019 and Easter 2020 holidays, with a particular focus on; addressing gaps in provision, increasing the numbers of disabled children accessing universal play



services, ensuring access to healthy food and increasing children's opportunities to play outdoors. It is envisaged that this will be done through the delivery of play activities by the Voluntary and Community Sector in Manchester. Grant applications must demonstrate how they will meet at least one of the following objectives:

Manchester Wellbeing Fund

Aims/priorities: In January 2017, Greater Manchester Mental Health NHS Foundation Trust (GMMH) embarked on an ambitious programme of clinical service



transformation to improve the mental health outcomes for people receiving their services and to support the wider mental wellbeing of Manchester citizens. Part of this vision for Manchester services involves building community support to promote mental wellbeing (feeling good and functioning well) and support people living with mental health conditions in the community. A budget of £1.5m has been allocated for the three-year Manchester Wellbeing Fund, for community groups and GMMH service users who have great ideas about how to support their communities. The main objectives of the Fund are:

- to develop community support around people's mental health needs
- to promote mental health and wellbeing
- to challenge the stigma around mental illness

Who can apply? The Fund is for groups and service users who are passionate about mental wellbeing in their communities. It is designed to support individual projects rather than provide core funding for organisations.

Grant amount: Grants of between £250 and £3,000 are available

Application process: Applicants need to first complete an Expression Form online. For grants of up to £500 applicants will only have to submit an Expression of Interest.

Near Neighbours

Aims/priorities: Near Neighbours brings people together from communities that are religiously and ethnically diverse,



so that they can get to know each other better, build relationships of trust and collaborate together on initiatives that improve the local community they live in. There are two key objectives:

 Social interaction – to develop positive relationships in multi-faith and multi-ethnic areas i.e. to help people from different faiths and ethnicities get to know and understand each other better • Social action – to encourage people of different faiths and of no faith and of different ethnicities to come together for initiatives that improve their local neighbourhood

Who can apply? Faith groups, places of worship, partnerships of different faith groups, and informal local groups comprising people of different faith groups. Secular organisations that are working with faith communities. Projects must run in one of these eligible areas: Manchester, Rochdale, Bury and Oldham.

available to communities to make their neighbourhoods better places to live. £20,000 of neighbourhood investment funding is available to every area (ward) in Manchester each year – to help groups carry out events and activities that benefit people in their local neighbourhood.

Who can apply? The fund is open to established groups, voluntary groups and other community groups, as well as groups of residents working together for the first time. School Parent Teacher Associations can also apply if they have the support of local residents and parents and the project benefits the wider community as well as the school.

Grant amount: Applications should not exceed £10,000

Application process: There is an online application form

The Andrew Lloyd Webber Foundation

Aims/priorities: Andrew Lloyd Webber Foundation offers grants in three different strands of funding:

- Unlock Grants for projects that increase diversity in the arts
 and heritage by breaking down social, economic and geographical barriers, encouraging engagement and providing high quality training to young people aged under 25, e.g. youth
- theatres, youth orchestras, side-by-side music initiatives, music therapy groups, music in prisons, heritage skill training
 Enhance Grants for projects that provide specialist training and work place experience
- Enhance Grants for projects that provide specialist training and work place experience and apprenticeships for emerging artists and newly graduated professionals, e.g. theatre

director schemes, actor mentoring and training, heritage building craft apprentices and training schemes, young composer schemes, writer's workshops

 Empower – Grants for projects that allow renowned practitioners to apply resources widely, unlocking access to high quality arts and heritage education and training for a significant number of people

Who can apply? Registered Charities, or not-for-profits e.g. Companies Limited by Guarantee, constituted community groups. Companies limited by shares are only eligible to apply if the grant is treated as restricted and will not make a profit for the organisation.

Grant amount: Unlock – Up to £5,000 per year. Enhance – Up to £10,000 per year. Empower – Up to £25,000 per year

Foyle Foundation

Aims/priorities: The Foundation seeks applications that make a strong artistic case for support in either the



performing or visual arts. The Arts programme has a twofold purpose to help sustain the arts and to support projects that help to deliver your artistic vision. The Foundation look for value for money, long term benefit and sustainability in projects that they support. Typical areas of support include:

- Helping to make the arts more accessible by developing new audiences, supporting tours, festivals and arts educational projects
- Encouraging new work and supporting young and emerging artists
- Building projects that improve or re-equip existing arts venues (rather than construction of new facilities, although this will not be excluded)
- Projects that encourage sustainability by reducing overheads or which help generate additional revenue

Aims/priorities: The PHF's mission is to "help people overcome disadvantage and lack of opportunity, so that they can realise their potential and enjoy fulfilling and creative lives". The Foundation places



particular focus on supporting both young people and the arts. The Foundation's Strategy 2015 identifies six strategic priorities relating to changes the PHF wishes to see in the UK. These are:

- To support imaginative people to nurture exciting ideas
- To widen access and participation in the arts
- To improve people's education and learning through the arts
- To show that the arts make a difference to people's lives
- To support the gendevelopment and growth of organisations investing in young people and positive change
- To improve support for young people who migrate, and strengthen integration so that communities can live well together

The funding schemes offered by the PHF are designed to support innovation, give people a voice, work with others and make lasting commitments.

Who can apply? Not-for-profit formally constituted organisations

- 'Explore and Test' grants of up to £60,000 for up to two years. Funding is designed to help explore and test both new approaches and ways of addressing new issues. Up to 20% of the grant may be allocated as a contribution to organisational running costs
- 'More and Better' grants of up to £400,000 for up to four years. Funding is intended to increase the impact and effectiveness of work which has already shown promise or positive impact

Aims/priorities: A day trip or a longer holiday of up to seven days. These can be to the countryside or a city, but must be within the UK and outside of children's immediate localities. Examples include camping, trips to adventure activity centres or the seaside.



Applications that will benefit disadvantaged or disabled children living in the most deprived areas of the UK will be prioritised. For Holiday Grants this means areas that fall within the bottom 20% according to the National Indices of Deprivation.

Who can apply? Schools, small charities and not-for-profit organisations

The Ragdoll Foundation

Aims/priorities: The Ragdoll Foundation's Open Grants scheme has been designed to support the cultural sector's work with children and young people. The Foundation's vision is to support projects where the concerns of childhood can be heard. The



Foundations primary purpose is to make grants for charitable purposes that:

- Evidence the power of arts and creativity and their transformative power for children and young people
- Promote children's development through their imaginative thinking
- Encourage innovative thinking and influence good practice elsewhere
- Ensure effective evaluation of projects to promote sharing and learning
- Above all, demonstrate how concerns of children can be heard

Preference will be given to innovative projects that share the same values of imagination and creativity as the Ragdoll Foundation. In particular, those projects which have a deep commitment to listening to children and allow the perceptions and feelings of children themselves to be better understood. The Foundation are mainly interested in applications that involve children during their early years, but appropriate projects for older children (up to 18 years) will also be considered.

Who can apply? The Ragdoll Foundation accepts applications from not-for-profit organisations based in the UK

Grant amount: Applications of up to £50,000 are welcome although the majority of grants are likely to be in the region of £5,000 to £20,000. Applications will be considered for both one-off short-term projects and for projects lasting up to three years.


