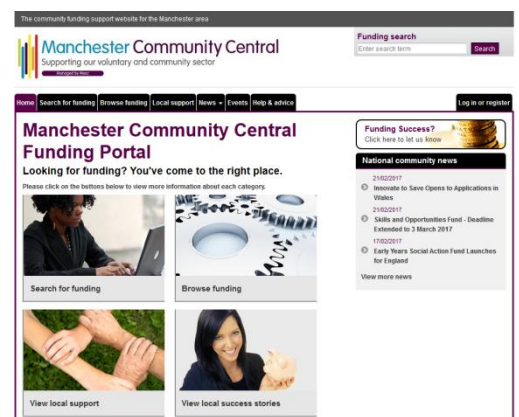

Fourteen £1k Awards

Aims/priorities: Fourteen is a £3.5m national programme funded by Spirit of 2012, a charity set up by the Big Lottery Fund to connect events to communities across the country; supporting opportunities in sport, physical activity, culture and the arts, volunteering and social action. Forever Manchester is the local partner responsible for managing the money and Harpurhey and Moston is the beneficiary area for the funding. The programme will seek to increase participation in the community through social action and



volunteering. Fourteen also seeks to increase inclusion, particularly for young people and people with disabilities.

Grant amount: Grants of up to £1,000 are available

Hate Crime Awareness grants

Aims/priorities: Manchester Community Safety Partnership has funding available to tackle hate crime. This funding has been running for several years and paid for some fantastic events and

projects. This is the first year that Macc will be involved in the administration of the programme.

Hate crime is heavily under-reported. More work needs to be done to highlight where and how reports can be made, to support victims to feel more confident to report hate crime incidents and to challenge hate crime in our communities. The aim of the funding is: to raise awareness of what hate crime is; to increase reporting; and to celebrate diversity in your communities.

A hate crime is an act of violence or hostility based on who you are or what someone thinks you are. The application form will ask for information about which areas of hate crime your event is focused on and how it will make an impact in this area of hate crime. There are six recognised area of hate crimes, which are listed below.

- Disability
- Race
- Religion or belief
- Sexual orientation
- Trans
- Alternative subculture

Who can apply? The funding programme is open to groups and organisations which meet all of the following criteria:

- The group or organisation is based in and of benefit to people living in the City of Manchester
- The group or organisation has a bank account in the name of your group/ organisation
- The event/ project is to be held in the city of Manchester
- The group agrees to complete and return the Grant Monitoring Form

- If your event is working with children or vulnerable adults, you will also be asked to provide your safeguarding policy

Grant amount: There is up to £400 available to apply for per organisation or group

Aims/priorities: Near Neighbours has two key objectives:

Grant Amount: Grants are available up to a maximum £5,000

Neighbourhood Investment Funds

Aims/priorities: These are funds available to communities to make their neighbourhoods better places to live. £20,000 of neighbourhood investment funding is available to every area (ward) in Manchester each year – to help groups carry out events and activities that benefit people in their local neighbourhood.



Who can apply? The fund is open to established groups, voluntary groups and other community groups, as well as groups of residents working together for the first time. School Parent Teacher Associations can also apply if they have the support of local residents and parents and the project benefits the wider community as well as the school.

Grant amount: Applications should not exceed £10,000

Young Manchester Youth and Play Fund 2018-2020

Aims/priorities: The purpose of this fund is Youth and Play, delivered by neighbourhood and city wide voluntary and community sector (VCS) partners to ensure children and young people aged 5-19 (up to 25 for care leavers and those with additional needs) have sufficient good quality access to Youth and Play services in their local areas and where the needs are greatest.

Who can apply? The fund is open to voluntary and community sector organisations based in Manchester or delivering services to children and young people that live in Manchester. This means not-for-profit, non-governmental, community-based organisations that are value-driven and that reinvest surpluses to further social, environmental or cultural objectives for the community.

Organisations must also:

- Be constituted
- Have a set of objectives that allows them to undertake the activities they are proposing
- Be value driven
- Be non-party political
- Provide services or activities that are not religious in nature and do not promote religious affiliation
- Have at least three trustees or directors (who are not related to each other and are not paid shareholders)



- Have a bank account in the organisation's name

Grant amount: The Fund – Pot 1. Universal Youth and Play with Social Action as a key driver in service delivery.

- Small grants up to £150k over 2 years
- Medium grants up to £250k over 2 years
- Large grants over £250K+ over 2 years

The Fund – Pot 2. Strategic Leadership – building capacity across the programme with a specific focus on proposals for driving change at local level.

- £180k over 2 years

Who can apply? Charities, community organisations, social enterprises and not-for-profit companies active in the arts are eligible to apply. Applicants must be working in partnership with schools or other formal education settings.

Grant amount: The Arts-based Learning Fund offers two levels of funding:

- 'Explore and Test' grants of up to £60,000 for up to two years. Funding is designed to help explore and test both new approaches and ways of addressing new issues. Up to 20% of the grant may be allocated as a contribution to organisational running costs
- 'More and Better' grants of up to £400,000 for up to four years. Funding is intended to help organisations, or the sector more broadly, to deliver more effective arts-based learning

Application process: Explore and Test: A one-stage application process is in place for this stream. An application form can be filled in online on the PHF website. An acknowledgement will be sent by email. More and Better: A two-stage application process is in place for this stream. An application form for stage one is available to complete online.

CHILDREN & YOUNG PEOPLE

Buttle UK – Young People Programme

Aims/priorities: Funding is available to enable vulnerable young people in the UK to overcome financial barriers preventing them from achieving their education, training or employment goals.



Support is available to the following young people who are:

- Age 16 to 20 years
- Estranged or orphaned and living outside the family home, receiving little or no financial or emotional support from family members
- In financial hardship
- Committed to pursuing a defined goal in relation to education, training or employment

- Working closely with support services
- Normally resident in the UK with the intention to remain in the country long term

The application must be completed by a lead professional in collaboration with the young person.

Who can apply: Registered charities in the UK

Grant amount: Funding is at the discretion of the Trustees. As a guide, the majority of previous grants have been for under £5,000, however, larger grants of up to £40,000 have also been awarded.

Application process: The Charity does not have a website, an email address, or a formal application form. Applications should be made in writing, providing background details about their charity, the project they want funding for, and a breakdown of the funding costs. Annual accounts are also required. Applications should be as brief as possible.

Cloth Worker Foundation

Aims/priorities: This Foundation awards grants in the following areas:

- Alcohol and substance misuse – projects supporting people affected by drug and/or alcohol dependency, and their families
- Disabled people – projects providing services for people with physical and/or learning disabilities, and/or for people with mental health issues (projects which focus only on meeting the requirements of the Disability Discrimination Act will not be considered)
- Disadvantaged minority communities – projects that work with minority communities facing both disadvantage (e.g. economic or cultural) and discrimination (e.g. due to ethnicity, sexuality, faith) to promote integration between minority communities and mainstream society
- Disadvantaged young people – projects which support disadvantaged young people, particularly, but not restricted to, those in or leaving care, or not in employment education or training (NEET)
- Domestic and sexual violence – projects supporting people affected by domestic or sexual violence or abuse
- Older people – projects providing services for older people, in particular people living in areas of high deprivation and/or where rural isolation is an issue

Who can apply? Capital grants are available to UK registered charities

Grant amount: There are two programmes:

- Main Grants Programme: there is no maximum project cost or grant amount. The average grant amount is £25,000
- Small Grants Programme: offers grants of up to £10,000, the average amount is £7,000. The total cost of the project must be less than £100,000

Application process: Applicants must first complete an online eligibility quiz to get access to an online application form which is universal and can be used for both the Main and Small grants programmes

Who can apply? Not-for-profit formally constituted organisations are eligible to apply

Grant amount: The Access and Participation Fund offers two levels of funding:

- 'Explore and Test' grants of up to £60,000 for up to two years. Funding is designed to help explore and test both new approaches and ways of addressing new issues. Up to 20% of the grant may be allocated as a contribution to organisational running costs
- 'More and Better' grants of up to £400,000 for up to four years. Funding is intended to increase the impact and effectiveness of work which has already shown promise or positive impact

Application process: Explore and Test – A one-stage application process is in place for this stream. An application form can be filled in online on the PHF website

More and Better – A two-stage application process is in place for this stream. An application form for stage one is available to complete online

Applicants will be informed if they have been successful in reaching the second stage within four weeks of the closing date, at which point further questions will be asked and a visit may be arranged.

ACT Foundation



Aims/priorities: The funding is for projects

that make a transformational change and have a high level of impact on individuals, their families and communities.

Grants generally fall into the following areas:

- Building – funding modifications to homes (where a Disabled Facilities Grant has already been awarded), charities, special schools, hospices, etc.
- Equipment – provision of specialist wheelchairs, other mobility aids and equipment including medical equipment and technology to assist independent living
- Respite – help towards the cost of short-term respite breaks at a registered respite centre.

The current priorities are:

- People with physical and mental disabilities
- The aged and those in need
- Hospices and end of life care
- Support of young carers

Who can apply? UK Charities must have been registered for at least three years may apply

Grant amount: Funding is at the discretion of the Trustees

Application process: Charities and overseas Charitable Organisations must submit a letter on the organisation's headed paper

Deadline: Applications may be submitted at any time and are considered four times a year. The Trust does not publish the dates of the Trustees' meetings

Allen Lane Foundation

Aims/priorities: To be eligible, the work must directly benefit adults from the following groups, or generalist

work which includes significant numbers from more than one such group:

- Asylum seekers and refugees (but not groups working with a single nationality)
- Gypsies and Travellers
- Migrant communities
- Offenders and ex-offenders
- Older people
- People experiencing mental health problems
- People experiencing violence or abuse

Who can apply? Small registered charities, voluntary groups and charitable organisations in the UK can apply



Grant amount: One-off grants of between £500 and £15,000 are available. The average grant is between £5,000 and £6,000. Grants repeated for more than one year vary from around £500 per annum up to £5,000 per annum, for a maximum of three years.
