What is GM Live Well?

- GM Live Well is Greater Manchester's commitment to growing great everyday support in every neighbourhood.
- It aims to reduce health, social and economic inequalities by strengthening community action and making support easier to access by connecting public services and the voluntary, community, faith and social enterprise (VCFSE) sector around what matters to people.

What it means for Manchester?

- Live Well Manchester is our local response to the GM vision.
- We're bringing together our existing city-wide reform work and neighbourhood model to make early support and prevention more joined up, more accessible and more community led, with equity and community voice at the heart of how services are designed and delivered.
- This includes strengthening the role of community spaces and hubs as welcoming 'front doors' to help and building the conditions for the VCFSE sector to lead and thrive alongside public services.

How might this look in practice?

Live Well centres, spaces and offers:

- Welcoming places and a consistent offer of support and activities that help people with the basics, build connections, and get help early.

An integrated neighbourhood way of working:

- Public services and VCFSE partners coordinating support locally, so people don't get passed around and support is joined-up around the person or family.

A 'no wrong door' approach:

- Wherever someone starts—community, council, NHS or VCFSE—they can be listened to, supported and connected to the right help.

A culture of prevention:

- Shared values, skills and ways of working that focus on early help, strengths-based practice and tackling inequalities.
