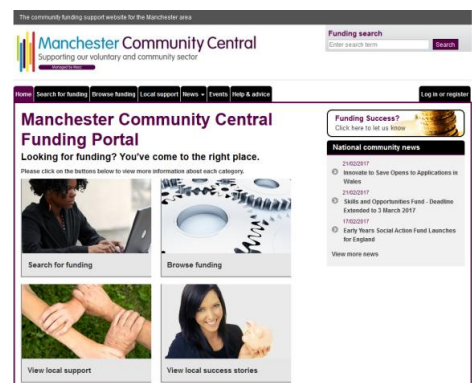

Who can apply?	<p>This is a tender so bidders are not required to be, e.g., registered charities or fall below a specified income threshold, but they must register on the Multi-Quote system in order to bid. An organisation could lead on up to two lots, but each bid needs to be focused on a local authority area.</p>

Projects should place children and young people at the heart of the creative process.</p> <p>For the Main Grants Programme, applications are considered for both one-off short term projects and for projects lasting up to three years.</p> <p>For the Small Grants Programme, applications are considered for innovative, small projects, pilots, or research and development to inform a new project or programme of work. This fund aims to support practitioners to take risks, push boundaries, invent, develop new methodologies and explorations. New and existing projects are eligible.</p>
