Neighbourhood Investment Funds

Aims/priorities: These are funds available to communities to make their neighbourhoods better places to live. £20,000 of neighbourhood investment funding is



available to every area (ward) in Manchester each year - to help groups carry out events and activities that benefit people in their local neighbourhood.

Who can apply? The fund is open to established groups, voluntary groups and other community groups, as well as groups of residents working together for the first time. School Parent Teacher Associations can also apply if they have the support of local residents and parents and the project benefits the wider community as well as the school.

Peter Kershaw Trust - Greater Manchester/Cheshire

Aims/priorities: Grants are not normally made for new building work but payments for fitting out of specialist premises may be made. Long term commitments are not usually made but an indication that a grant may be paid, subject to conditions and annual review, for up to three years may be given.



Who can apply? Ordinary Grants: These grants are made for a wide variety of purposes under the general heading of 'social welfare', e.g. to assist people with medical conditions, disabilities, addictions, to help the aged, youth work etc. Applications for new work are welcome and the Trustees give special consideration for 'pump priming' requests

Spirit of Manchester 2017 mini-grants programme

Aims/priorities: The mini-grants are intended to help improve the impact of VCSE organisations in the north of Manchester where VCSE activity is lowest in the city and to promote mutual support



activity between organisations. To be eligible to apply, your mini-project must:

- benefit north Manchester by raising VCSE activity levels in that area
- take place at some point between the beginning of May and 1 September 2017
- involve working with one other named VCSE organisation to deliver shared aims
- be match-funded by volunteer hours at the rate of £8.45 per hour

Macc wants the geographical focus of the mini-grants to be north Manchester. North Manchester has the lowest levels of VCSE activity when compared to central and southern areas of the city and the mini-grants are intended to help raise activity levels. This programme is most likely to support bids from applicants that are already working in north Manchester that propose to partner either with another north-based VCSE organisation or with perhaps a citywide VCSE organisation that wishes to engage more closely with local community groups in north Manchester.

For the purposes of this programme, a mini-project must consist of a partnership between two VCSE organisations to deliver a new small-scale, short-term activity that meets the aims of both organisations and contributes to the development of VCSE activity levels in north Manchester.

BBC Children in Need – grants programme

Aims/priorities: The BBC Children in Need grant supports UK charities and not for profit organisations working with disadvantaged children and young people who are 18 years old and under. Small



grants of £10,000 or less per year for up to three years and Main Grants over £10,000 per year for up to three years

Who can apply? Children in Need give grants for projects delivered by organisations working with disadvantaged children and young people, who must be 18 years and under, living in the UK, the Isle of Man or the Channel Islands. Disadvantages experienced by children and young people include:

- Illness, distress, abuse or neglect
- Any kind of disability
- Behavioural or psychological difficulties
- Living in poverty or situations of deprivation

The application should focus on the children your project will work with and the differences that your project will make for them. You should clearly be able to demonstrate how your project will change the lives of the children involved for the better. Where possible it should take into account their views and involve them in decisions that affect them

They also have a small budget for UK charities which are working on projects in developing countries. Trusthouse gives grants for running costs or one-off capital costs to charities and not-for-profit organisations in accordance with criteria that are regularly reviewed and decided by the Trustees. Applicants must clearly show in their appeal how their project fits into one or both of these categories.

Sport England Community Asset Fund

Aims/priorities: Sport England is making £15 million available annually for local community organisations, clubs, statutory bodies and educational establishments to support projects which create or improve opportunities to play sport and get active in local communities.



improve opportantice to play sport and get delive in local communices.

The new funding programme aims to help Sport England achieve the following:

- Improve and protect existing sports facilities that support the needs of local communities
- Invest in new and different places that meet the needs of local communities, which include Sport England's target audiences
- Ensure Sport England's capital investment reaches organisations that have not accessed
 Sport England's funding before
- Create a more resilient, sustainable, less grant dependent sport sector

Grant amount:

- Small Scale Investments (£1,000 and £15,000) to cover the cost of emergency works due
 to something like storm or flood damage, or something totally unexpected that is stopping
 people from being able to stay active right now
- Medium Scale Investments (£15,000 and £50,000) to make more substantial changes.
 This might be an upgrade to an existing facility or developing a new space in the community
- Large Scale Investments (£50,000 and £150,000) for projects which can demonstrate a considerable impact or are targeting under-represented groups

The funding does not have to be used for a traditional space or traditional sport, but can be used for canal towpaths, woodlands and open spaces which have the potential to be used and enjoyed as part of an active lifestyle.

Lloyds Banking Group – Credit Union Development Fund

Aims/priorities: Priority may be given to:

 Credit unions that are sharing data with credit reference agencies in order to help individuals to build their credit score, overall national credit scoring profiling and the credit union to manage their debt default exposure. (This will be a condition of grant if not already in place)



- Those credit unions that serve communities in the most deprived communities according to the National Indices of Multiple Deprivation
- Credit unions seeking funding to support mergers

- Large awards (£50,000, £75,000 or £100,000) will provide a contribution to a credit union's reserves or capital activities and help remove barriers to growth and innovation
