Aims/priorities: These are funds available to communities to make their neighbourhoods better places to live. £20,000 of neighbourhood investment funding is available to every area



(ward) in Manchester each year - to help groups carry out events and activities that benefit people in their local neighbourhood.

Who can apply: The fund is open to established groups, voluntary groups and other community groups, as well as groups of residents working together for the first time. School Parent Teacher Associations can also apply if they have the support of local residents and parents and the project benefits the wider community as well as the school.

Grant amount: Applications should not exceed £10,000

Deadline: Ongoing, apply at any time

ARTS

Granada Foundation

Aims/priorities: Grant for voluntary and community organisations undertaking projects that encourage involvement in and understanding of the fine arts and science in the North West of



England. The Foundation wishes to encourage and promote the study, practice and appreciation of the fine arts, including drawing, architecture and landscape architecture, sculpture, literature, music, opera, drama, cinema, and the methods and means of their dissemination. The Foundation also welcomes applications which aim to engage and inspire young people and adults to take an interest in science. In general, the Council looks for imaginative proposals which will in some way make the north-west a richer and more attractive place in which to live and work. Preference is given to supporting new projects. Although the Foundation will support festivals and other annual events, it is on the understanding that such support should not be regarded as automatically renewable.

Who can apply: Organisations in the North West of England are eligible to apply. Preference will be given to organisations with charitable status

Grant amount: No stated minimum or maximum amounts

Application process: Applications are made via a two-stage application process:

- Applicants must first submit an enquiry form or call the Foundation for an informal discussion
- An application form will then be sent to organisations that the Foundation considers suitable to apply

Aims/priorities: Funds particular projects with an overall cost of less than £1m where the main element is capital costs (building



work, refurbishment or the purchase of long-term equipment) or a one-off short term activity (such as an annual respite break or holiday for disadvantaged young people.) Applicants must have already raised a third of the total costs. They do not fund ongoing running costs.

Who can apply: Registered charities and churches for projects that benefit UK residents in UK communities

Grant Amount: One-off grants of between £500 and £15,000 are available. The average grant is between £5,000 and £6,000. Grants repeated for more than one year vary from around £500 per annum up to £5,000 per annum, for a maximum of three years.

DISABILITY AND CARERS

The de Brye Charitable Trust

Aims/priorities: The de Brye Charitable Trust (formerly known as the Stanley Smith General Charitable Trust) offers grants to charitable organisations active in the UK. Funding is intended to support charitable projects that benefit those with physical disabilities in the UK and is available for the care and housing of older people, orphans and neglected children and for aid to physically disabled children and to the blind.

Who can apply: Charitable organisations based and working in the UK may apply.

Trust House Charitable Foundation Small Grants

Aim/Purpose: This grants programme supports projects in the UK which address

issues in Rural Communities and/or areas of Urban Deprivation. They want to support established organisations which are working in the following areas: Community Support; Arts, Education and Heritage; Disability and Health Care.

Who can apply: Charities and not-for-profit organisations in the UK with incomes under £500,000 that have been running for over a year. You must have annual accounts from the previous year in order to apply. (Trust House Charitable Foundation also runs a large grants programme, which accepts applications from organisations with incomes under £5 million)

Grant Amount: You can apply for up to £9,999 towards running costs or capital costs.

Application Process: Fill in an application form on their website. You can't save this as you go along, so it is a good idea to draft your answers separately first. Send your application by post to Trusthouse Charitable Foundation, 65 Leadenhall Street, London, EC3A 2AD.

Deadline: Applications for £5000 or less will be fast tracked, and you will receive an answer within 8 weeks of applying. Applications for £5001-£9999 will be assessed at quarterly meetings, which are usually held in April, July, October and January. Each meeting will assess applications that have been received up to 8 weeks before the meeting.

Church Urban Fund Together Grants

Aims/Purpose: Activities must be directly related to tackling deprivation in the long term, addressing the underlying issues keeping people in poverty, working directly with people in need. The lead applicant should have a faith basis and need to partner with at least one other local organisation. Applications need to a local community focus: The activity needs to be based in the local



community and to have local community involvement in identifying needs, initiating responses and running the project.

Who Can Apply: Faith based organisations

Grant Amount: Small grants of up to £5,000

Application Process: Ensure that you have read through the criteria and guidance in detail to establish your eligibility. You will need to discuss your proposal with the Church Urban Fund Link, and if appropriate you will be offered an application form.

SPORT & RECREATION

Sport England - Small Grant Scheme

Aims/priorities: The Sport England Small Grants Programme has been set up to support local community sport projects which seek to increase participation, sustain participation or develop opportunities



for people aged 14+ to excel at their chosen sport. Projects must meet at least one of the following criteria.

- An increase in the proportion of 14-25's playing sport once a week
- A growth in regular (once a week) participation for all those aged 14+
- A reduction in drop off at ages 16, 18, 21 & 24
- Growth in participation by people (aged 14+) with a disability

Who can apply: It is open to any bona fide not-for-profit club or association, statutory body or educational establishment. The total project costs must not exceed £50,000

Grant amount: Grants of between £300 and £10,000 are available for project costs

Application process: Complete an eligibility self-checklist first. If you are eligible, apply via a single-stage online form. Bids should be submitted 3 months before projects are due to start

Sport England – Get Equipped Fund

Aims/priorities: Sport England know that many organisations and clubs delivering sport struggle to provide sporting opportunities for disabled people because of a lack of access to specialist



equipment. To address this, the Get Equipped fund will invest £1 million of National Lottery funding into the provision of specialist equipment to deliver sport to disabled people. The majority of funded projects will be using the equipment to encourage people aged 14+ to take part.

Who can apply: Get Equipped can fund formally constituted not-for-profit organisations and statutory bodies. This might include sports clubs, voluntary organisations, local authorities, schools or governing bodies of sport.

Grant amount: £300 - £10,000

AWARDS

Glaxo Smith Kline (GSK) IMPACT Awards

Aims/priorities: The IMPACT Awards are an annual scheme, funded by GlaxoSmilthKline (GSK) as part of the company's commitment to promoting community health and wellbeing. The scheme is delivered in partnership with The King's Fund. The Awards recognise and reward charities that are doing excellent work to improve people's health.



Applicants must target community health needs in the UK and have a track record of achievement in this area. The Awards recognise excellence in existing work and do not seek to fund new projects. The assessment is based on the work of the whole organisation and the assessment will focus on excellence in the six areas of IMPACT. The judges will be looking for evidence of: Innovation; Management; Partnership; Achievement; Community focus; and Targeting needs.

Who can apply: Registered charities in the UK with a total annual income of between £25,000 -

£2million

Grant amount: Up to ten winners will receive £30,000 unrestricted funding with one overall winner receiving £40,000. Winners will also receive free training and development valued at up to £6,000, a specially commissioned professional film and photographs along with publicity and press support. Up to ten runners-up will receive £3,000
